BEWARE OF INFORMATION OVERLOAD!

The Guardian online recently carried an interesting article by neuroscientist Daniel J Levitin ('Why the modern world is bad for your brain', 18 January 2015), in which he describes how and why we are neurally addicted to checking email, Facebook and Twitter. He writes about the delusion of multi-tasking and how, rather than making us more efficient (we all like to think it does!), it can ultimately lead to us making very bad decisions!

Levitin also brilliantly, and somewhat sardonically, sums up our use of the smartphone:

"Our smartphones have become Swiss army knife-like appliances that include a dictionary, calculator, web browser, email, Game Boy, appointment calendar, voice recorder, guitar tuner, weather forecaster, GPS, texter, tweeter, Facebook updater, and flashlight. They're more powerful and do more things than the most advanced computer at IBM corporate headquarters 30 years ago. And we use them all the time, part of a 21st-century mania for cramming everything we do into every single spare moment of downtime."





TIPS TO HELP YOUR

CHILD SELF-MOTIVATE

"Nurturing intrinsic motivation, which is goal orientated rather than reward orientated, encourages a love of learning, natural curiosity and maximum effort to achieve."

All children are born with an intrinsic motivation to learn. As they grow, however, they are faced with so many extrinsic influences: expectations from parents and teachers to perform well, a fear of failure or letting others down, fear of punishment, and lack of stimulation. This can lead them to lose their natural ability to self-motivate. In fact the messages that we give our children, at home and in school, can profoundly affect their attitude to learning. So much so that if we are not careful, they can develop into disaffected, disinterested and highly demotivated teenagers!

The majority of education systems measure success in terms of results and, by default, parents tend to do the same. Encouragement to succeed, do well or complete a task often involves the prospect of a reward if a child lives up to expectations and punishment if they do not. But studies indicate that punishment or persistently negative criticism demotivates learning while nurturing intrinsic motivation, which is goal orientated rather than reward orientated, encourages a love of learning, natural curiosity and maximum effort to achieve.

Here's how to encourage self-motivation in your child:

Establish strong self-belief from the start. Show your child you believe in them from the very beginning. Nurturing words and touches, a caring tone of voice, celebration of little successes and praise for effort helps form your child's attitude towards their own ability to achieve. Positive thinking directly affects their level of motivation.

Create the right environment. Growing up in a loving, supportive and affirming environment that respects individuality and fosters independence creates a strong sense of self-worth. We can enable this by creating a structure for our children, with clear boundaries and set routines that help them feel safe, secure and manage expectations. Similar to positive thinking, positive emotions about self and others increases a child's level of motivation.

What sort of learner is your child? All children are not all motivated in the same way. Just as with adults, children have different likes, dislikes and natural abilities so some children's natural motivation to learn may require more nurturing and

stimulation than others. Know and understand your child's instinctive learning style. Are they an auditory, visual or kinesetic learner? Observe if your child becomes bored easily. Intelligent children often become demotivated through lack of stimulation so ask yourself how much your child really loves what they are doing?

Exposure to a variety of experiences helps activate interest as your child discovers what excites them and what they are good at. Whether going on a nature trail along the beach or attending an enrichment programme they enjoy, stimulating activities that arouse natural curiosity help create a love of learning and will motive your child's innate desire to discover.

Let your child decide. When a child feels interested and good about what they are doing, their confidence grows and with it their own desire to learn and achieve. Support your child as they discover their niche or passions. Their own willingness to succeed is a far deeper motivation for learning than acting out of a willingness to please parents or teachers.

Failure is good! Research shows that our inability to accept failure as a good thing demotivates our desire to try again, so encourage your child to accept failure as a positive learning experience. Talk to your child about what they have achieved rather than what they have not, offering praise and supportive comments where appropriate. Providing honest and realistic feedback about the outcome of an activity, performance or your child's behaviour is important but avoid negative judgements and criticisms about their ability that are likely to knock their confidence and self-esteem.

Set attainable goals that challenge your child but enable them to feel good about their achievements and prospects of further success. Nurture your child's sense of "I can" rather than "I can't" - they are more likely to want to try again and again and again.

Be an inspirational role model. There is no greater spark to selfmotivation than looking up to someone we love and admire who inspires us to succeed. We all have our heroes but you are your child's first and closest teacher with the most power to ensure they grow up to be happy, well rounded and self-achieving adults.

SPOTLIGHT ON...

CHARMAINE KLYNE, HEAD OF CENTRE, CHILTERN HOUSE THOMSON

Charmaine Klyne, Head of Centre at Chiltern House Thomson, admits there is a tear or two among her staff when they reminisce about the old black and white building that accommodated Chiltern House Halifax Road for so many years. "I felt very sad to leave my 'home'! It was a warm, very friendly and even crazy place at times. It's where many of us grew."

On 30th December, Charmaine, along with members of her team, returned to Halifax to sing Auld Lang Syne. A sort of symbolic final farewell. "It was a very emotional moment", says Charmaine. Chiltern House Preschool has been Charmaine's home away from home for the past ten years, the last three as Head of Centre at Chiltern House Halifax Road, before its relocation to the SLF building on Thomson Road. This latest Chiltern House branch is dramatically different from all the others. It is the first to represent the preschool's rebranded appearance. "The look is very clean. It's certainly very new in every way!", Charmaine



declares. "It does take a little getting used to but we have to change with the times - and I've been promising my Chiltern House Halifax parents that we will have a bigger space. Our assembly hall used to get so cramped that that there was standing room only for parents — on tip-toes!"

"Now, we have ten classrooms, when previously we had only seven. This means we are able to open our pre-nursery in Term 2, which we are excited about. There are two activity



rooms for speech and drama, music, and assemblies. And we have a staff room. Something we never had before!" (Cue excitement from Charmaine.)

One thing that Charmaine assures everyone will never change is the unique Chiltern House culture; reflected in the school's approach to its entire community — staff, students and parents. As Head of Centre, Charmaine views collaboration with her team as key to ensuring a smooth operation and to maintaining quality. She describes her approach to leadership as relaxed and tactful, yet firm, preferring open communication and role-modelling expectations, as opposed to cracking the whip! "Communication is one of the most important elements to forming strong relationships and successful partnerships. I don't work alone! My team is mature and passionate about

what they do. There are always bound to be clashes from time to time but I never allow any negative differences to fester. We sit down, we work things out, we carry on! I enjoy working with and for my team!"

Teaching for Charmaine continues to be a lifelong learning experience that enables her to grow simultaneously with the students under her care. "I enjoy my work enormously", Charmaine says. "Yes, it is a very challenging job and I do have my ups and down. But looking at the children and seeing how we have helped them develop, makes it all worthwhile. I've also taken my 'teachings' back home and have started working with my grandchildren!"

Chiltern House Preschool's 'nurturing qualities of home' have come full circle!

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
